

THE SHOOTING......A true story by Gordon Jackson

During the 60s and early 70s we had a band at HMAS Albatross.

I got there in 1964 and stayed on and off until 1973 minus 18 months when I was on the HMAS Sydney (Vung Tau Ferry). It was a great place to be as we had the whole cinema as our band room, library and instrument room and we use to play poker behind the screen.

Sometime mid 1964 or 5, 5 of us decided we would go on a night shooting trip over to Kangaroo Valley (rabbits and foxes) with a spotlight and each with a rifle. Some of the band members had rifles that could be stored at the married quarters or the gunnery school.

This trip was a disaster waiting to happen, from memory the were 2 single shot rifles a repeater rifle and a small shot gun, the light was powered by 6 volt car battery.

The merry men were Eric Pearce, Kipper Kearsley, Mac Haynes and myself and perhaps another maybe Tex Callag- John Lennon. er or Rocky, I can't quite remember.

Off we went to the valley, found a farming area and walked with light on and loaded rifles looking for game. Within 5 minutes we heard the distinct sound of a running Bull coming our way at a rate of knots. Panic took over and I remember my uncle telling me never run with a loaded rifle which I tried to convey to the others but our fast walk soon turned into a run and then the shots rang out.

Someone stumbled and the shotgun went off then Eric tripped on a log and his repeater fired 2 shots and Kipper shouted "you have shot me".

This was a disaster. We met the ambulance at the top of the mountains between kangaroo valley and Nowra after phoning from a farmers house.

Kipper was taken to the Nowra hospital and required surgery to remove his spleen. The police interviewed each of us and were satisfied this was and accident although Eric felt bad about it understandably.

Kipper (Ken) after recovering stopped playing tuba (Eb bass) and moved to trombone which proved a good move for him in future years . I think he is still playing here in Perth somewhere.

Its not a tale to be proud of, we were all young, 18 to 22 perhaps. If anyone else out there remembers the incident please let me know.

PS: We never did see this bull as it was dark, we just heard the galloping coming towards us.

Later when we talked with the farmer whose land we were on he confirmed it was a bull which I am sure took off after the first shot rang out.

Editorial, Letters and Comments

A great article from Phil Anderson posted on our facebook page regarding bands at sea. This copy was extracted from his excellent website, Band Tune Up Solutions.

Recent posts and comments on social media about the embarkation of a 'Fleet Band' in HMAS *Canberra III* for RIMPAC 2022 have caused me to recall a conversation and a formal proposal regarding establishing a band permanently on both of the Landing Helicopter Dock (LHD) ships HMAS *Canberra III* and HMAS *Adelaide III*.

To-date, the last permanent band posted to sea was in HMAS *Jervis Bay*. When *Jervis Bay* deployed to Somalia in Christmas 1992 the Fleet Band was disembarked and moved to HMAS *Kuttabul's* Endeavour House. When *Jervis Bay* decommissioned in March 1994 there was no longer any ship in the fleet that was large enough to embark a permanent band; so the musicians in the Fleet Band were reassigned to the Naval Support Command Band at HMAS *Kuttabul* and the Victoria Naval Band at HMAS *Cerberus*.

When I became the Director of Music Navy in 2002, as an absolute priority, I reestablished the band's commitment to sea by standing up a Sea Deployment Group within our current workforce. This was not universally welcomed by the musician cohort; but I had formed the view, based on my experience over the previous decade, that it was absolutely imperative for the band to regain the support of Navy's senior leaders. There had been a number of serious incidents that had damaged the band's reputation and threats of Government cost-saving initiatives on Australian Defense Force Bands made the environment even more difficult. Interestingly, the both the Australian Army Band and Royal Australian Airforce Band sustained a 50% reduction in musician numbers during the first decade of this century whilst the number of musicians in the Royal Australian Navy Band remained unchanged.

To manage this return to sea, musicians would be nominated for sea deployments each year from within the two permanent detachments. Nomination meant that the musicians were to be released from normal band duties to be force prepared and if the need arose they would then be embarked as a musical element in a Major Fleet Unit (MFU). On average, from 2002 to 2011, two small elements from the Sea Deployment Group were embarked in MFUs each year; including eight to 12 musicians for RIMPAC every year. These were temporary short posting and after each posting the musicians would return to their permanent detachments in Melbourne and Sydney.

With the new LHDs planned for commissioning in 2014 and 2015 respectively, I saw an opportunity for reestablishing a permanent band at sea; so I made an informal approach to the LHD workforce capability planner about the possibility of including a permanent band within **one** of these ships. However, my brief discussion quickly led me to rethink the wisdom of changing the status quo (that is; short, targeted and temporary postings) and I dropped my wish to reestablish a permanent Fleet Band.

A few months later, to my surprise and trepidation, I received a

formal proposal staffed through Navy Headquarters and Fleet Headquarters. It seems that my informal approach to the capability planner had whet his appetite (as he was searching for ways to crew these large ships) and now he wanted to establish within each of the two LHDs a compliment 12 to 20 musicians as a permanent part of the each ships company. The musicians would undertake additional duties as first aide parties and as ship guides for the embarked forces.

Navy Headquarters supported the plan but stipulated that there would be **no increase** to the current approved workforce numbers for the band category. In particular, Navy Headquarters supported posting up to 20 musicians permanently to sea in **each** of the new ships. That is, 40 musicians posted permanently at sea each year for a two year posting cycle, and this would have to be managed from within the current approved workforce of 110 full-time musicians.

Under the 'one band' structure that I had developed shortly after becoming Director of Music, the band was able to enhance its support to fleet activities by embarking, on numerous occasions, small musical elements for major deployments. Additionally, whilst supporting the fleet the band was also able to deploy larger ensembles to support the Australian forces in Iraq, Afghanistan and in other operational theatres. At the same time whilst supporting the Fleet and the Australia Defence Force, the band was still able to conduct benchmark activities; including many significant recordings, large international deployments and very impressive ceremonial activities throughout Australia and overseas.

Furthermore, my predecessor Commander Ashley Greedy AM RAN had commenced a recruitment program in the mid 1990s to attract university graduates into the band. As a result of his initiative the skill level amongst the musicians had increased very significantly since the last time the band category had two bands at sea in the 60's and 70's aboard HMAS *Sydney* and HMAS *Melbourne*. I was in no doubt that the band's ability to retain and attract highly skilled musicians would be at serious risk if one of the job requirements was to spend 40+% of their initial enlistment period posted to a ship at sea.

Fortunately, I was able to convince the Fleet Commander that the band's ability to continue its impressive activities at home, at sea and abroad, would be in jeopardy if 40 of its 110 musicians were to be permanently posted to HMAS *Canberra III* and HMAS *Adelaide III*.

Thankfully, the proposal was defeated and we were able to continue to send musicians to sea for targeted high profile deployments. We were also able to continue to deliver our very impressive range of capabilities at home and abroad.

We can continue to celebrate the band's ongoing support to the Fleet and it's history of service at sea; but as experienced by my desire to get musicians back at sea on a permanent basis, be careful what you wish for, lest it come true!



4.4.11 Claims relating to asbestos exposure while serving on certain RAN vessels

Last Amended Wednesday, May 13, 2020.

Claims for Asbestos-Related Conditions: Royal Australian Navy Service 1940-2003

Where any claimant contended exposure to asbestos in the course of service, delegates have previously been required to seek advice confirming the exposure through the Defence Single Access Mechanism (SAM). As part of the subsequent investigation, claimants have been required to complete a questionnaire. The investigative process is often a lengthy one.

The Repatriation and Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Commission has agreed that for those who served on board any of the Royal Australian Navy (RAN) ships listed below between 1 January 1940 and 31 December 2003, it no longer necessary to seek case-by-case confirmation of asbestos exposure as it is known that asbestos was likely to be present on those ships during that period.

In August 2019, the Repatriation Commission further agreed that, for the purpose of the application of Statements of Principles (SoPs) under the Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986, 75 per cent of an individual's time served on the listed RAN ships between 1 January 1940 and 31 December 2003 will be taken to have been rendered in an enclosed environment containing respirable asbestos fibres. This is relevant because the SoPs for a number of conditions include a factor relating to being in an enclosed environment containing respirable asbestos fibres for a prescribed amount of time.

Where 75 per cent of time spent on the listed ships within the relevant period is equal to or greater than the cumulative total time spent in an enclosed environment containing respirable asbestos fibres prescribed by a factor in the SoP for a claimed condition, that SoP factor will to be taken to be met. No additional confirmation of exposure to asbestos is required where the claim is for an asbestos-related condition connected to service aboard any of the vessels listed below, where that service was rendered between 1 January 1940 and 31 December 2003 and 75 per cent of the time aboard the vessel meets the relevant enclosed environment SoP factor.

The list of vessels has been provided by the Department of Defence and shows ships on board which members may have been exposed to asbestos during the relevant period. For any claims which relate to service other than on board any of the listed vessels during the relevant period, the previous policy must still be followed, and a request for confirmation should still be sought via Defence SAM. If a client claims service on a RAN ship not in the below list, please check with the Liability and Service Eligibility [1] policy section before raising a SAM request.

It should be noted that while this policy change primarily affects claims by RAN veterans, it applies equally to members of all armed services, i.e. where an Army or Air Force member served aboard a listed ship, there is likewise no need to seek individual confirmation of exposure from Defence. While this policy removes the need to seek confirmation of asbestos exposure in relation to certain claims, a connection between any claimed condition and asbestos exposure must still be established. All the normal legislative requirements must still be met in relation to establishing a connection to service, including ensuring that all components of the relevant SoP factor are met. Further, while this policy is intended to assist in the speedy resolution of claims that meet the requirements set out in the policy, it should not be used as a reason to reject claims. Where a claim does not meet the requirements for acceptance under this policy, other possible avenues, such as other relevant SoP factors, and/or other potential asbestos exposures should be investigated in line with existing claims processing guidelines.

The basis of the end date of 31 December 2003 is that the importation and installation of new asbestos components was prohibited after this date. It is understood that in practice, the use of asbestos in RAN vessels was becoming more and more limited by this time. In addition, Navy was directed to remove asbestos from ships by 31 December 2010. Some exposures after this date are known to have occurred, but these are well documented. Similar documentation is

likely to exist for any exposures which occurred after 31 December 2003. For this reason, where a claim relates to contended exposure to asbestos after this date, individual confirmation should be sought from Defence.

Please note that, where a date range ending with 'present' is given in the list below, this reflects only the fact that at the time when the list was provided by the Department of Defence, the vessel was still in RAN service. The last relevant date of service for the purposes of this policy remains 31 December 2003.

Further to this, the RAN follows a tradition whereby should a ship be decommissioned its name may be used on subsequent ships. Members tend to refer to the ship without making distinctions as to its commissioning date. So, although a client may have technically served on HMAS Melbourne II or HMAS Melbourne III they would likely consider that they served on the HMAS Melbourne and not make such a distinction clear in their claim. The claimant's date of service will indicate which iteration of the ship they served on.


