
Welcome to this our latest edition of the Magazine. Not much has happened since the last edition but we have some good new and some not so, but life has to go on.



MY FIRST ANZAC DAY AND OTHERS...... Jim Hawkins

It was the 25th April 1954 when as an 11 year old drummer in the St George Sutherland Shire Brass Band I caught the 7.30am Blue Bus from near my home in Bexley NSW down to Rockdale Station where a train to the city wasn't far off. My very first memory of that morning was getting dressed into a very itchy serge uniform – handed down over many years – and as proud as punch wearing my white cap with the band badge on the cap band.

Getting on to the train at Rockdale was another memory with all the Diggers' medals jingling as nobody had their medals court mounted back then and this sound continued when we all got off the train and hundreds of people made their way to the assembly places near Martin Place. There was no Martin Place station in 1954.

I was told to look out for 'Ozzie' our elderly bass drummer, and as I had never been allowed to go to the city alone before this day, it was rather daunting finding the assembly point when everyone else seemed to know exactly where they were going.

In 1954 there were tens of thousands of WW2 Diggers and hundreds of WW1 Diggers marching on this important day, and many more bands took part compared to today. In my area of residence alone we had our band, then Hurstville Brass (A grade), Kogarah Brass, Bexley Brass, Rockdale Brass then two CMF Bands, 45th Batt. based in Hurstville and 4th Batt. Based in Arncliffe. The Artillery Band at Kogarah wasn't formed until 1958. It was similar all over Sydney with many more marching bands available for Anzac Day than we see today, and almost no school bands invited to participate except for the very finest Army Cadet Bands which included Marist Brothers Kogarah of which a neighbor of mine was Drum Major.

I recall being very excited when we stepped off on what was my first long march carrying a heavy side drum, past the thousands of people clapping as we went past them. Too soon it was over so I stood near the finish of the march near Hyde Park and listened to other bands as they approached the conclusion and recall the sounds of those bass trombones hitting the very low notes with their slides extended with the use of a handle.

Then I had to make my way back to the railway and back home, slightly uncomfortable in the serge uniform on that very hot day. I did four more of those marches with ST George until 1959 when I was 'seconded' to the 18LAA Band under Bandmaster WO1 Frank McGuiness as an under aged drummer in a borrowed uniform. I was rather tall and got away with it, and thank goodness no official approached me and asked me for I.D! Later that year I joined the RAN and didn't march in Sydney until 1963 with the Penguin Band, then many more after that. Included was a proud moment in 1971 when I was the WO1 Bandmaster of the 18LAA Band - the full circle had been completed.

In 2000 it was a privilege to be the Drum Major of the RAN Veterans Band when 80 former musicians paraded during our National Reunion and the band was led by former DOM, the late Norm Gullick. That was one to remember as we did the march twice to help the band numbers.

I did march in 2019 with my cobber Mick Wortham and the route had been changed somewhat from the original to one starting uphill and a real knee challenge for a couple of 'crocs'.

AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTIONAL BY LAWS

In the Xmas edition of the Magazine, a **BALLOT PAPER** was placed to alter a section of our Constitution (AS SHOWN BELOW), VOTING was open until the 31st March 2023.

Only 14 Members voted, the Association Constitution requires a quorum of 5 Members to vote.

The result of the Vote was 12 YES and 2 NO;

The AMENDMENT was accepted.

A Special General Meeting was held prior to the Annual General Meeting, 19th August 2022 to discuss amendment to the following section of the RANBA Constitution By Laws.

The meeting was unable to agree on the wording of this motion, so the meeting was informed that an amended wording would be made and sent out to all members of Association to vote on electronically.

AMENDMENT IS PRINTED IN BLUE BELOW. SECTION b) ASSOCIATE MEMBERSHIP

1 MEMBERSHIP

- **Full Membership** with voting rights is a former serving member of the Permanent Royal Australian Navy Band or the Royal Australian Navy Band Reserve
- **Associate Membership** is available to Widows, family of full members and to former members of The Royal Marines and foreign Navy Bands. Associate Members may attend General Meetings and participate but have no voting rights
- Associate Members who are a members of the RAN Veterans Band may attend General Meetings and have voting rights ONLY in relation to RAN Veterans Band matters.
- **Honorary Membership** can be afforded to any person who has offered outstanding assistance to the RANBA and musicians who assist from time to time in the RAN Veterans Band but have no voting rights.
- **Serving Members** of the Royal Australian Navy Band are invited to become members in the category of Honorary Members but if they wish to receive the Association Newsletter and the use of the Association Web Site, they would need to apply for Associate Membership or Full Membership if they want to vote.
- As per changes to the Association Incorporation Regulation 2022, Schedule 2, 4(2)(a) and 5(3)(a); Schedule 2, 1(1) relating to postal voting, the Ballot Paper sets out details of the Amendment and voting can be now electronically sent to <u>admin@ranbandassoc.net</u>
- Members can still return a this Ballot Paper via Post to PO BOX 69, LYNBROOK.VIC.3975 with a circle around YES of NO below.

South Australian Report: By Doug Drysdale


Greetings from South Australia.

I would like to share with you some thoughts about my mate Bob Bedwell, gone too early, nearly made 77 years of age, BLOODY HELL.

Bob joined with Ron Henry and Jim Hawkins to bring this wonderful Association into being in 1994 and ever since had been an active Member and assisted me greatly with the formation of the RAN Veterans Band and the Incorporation of the Association.

Bob joined the Navy Band in 1963 after auditioning on Fife, on the phone with Don Coxon, he became a brilliant Clarinet player and overall Musician and created musical pathways for hundreds of kids through his lifetime.

I met Bob at the School of Music and we managed to weave havoc both in and out of the Navy, we were firm mates, both of us pretty good squash players, in fact we became Commander Brasch, XO of HMAS Cerberus, practice bunnies. Once we both worked out his devilish game we retaliated and started to smash the ball into him at every chance, one way the belt a senior officer around and not get locked up.

I played in various musical combinations over the years, but the funniest time I had was playing in the Orchestra for Tony Price Productions and Bob was Conductor. He used to get his rocks off by feeding prompts to the Cast but not from the show we were playing but another, ie South Pacific and we were performing Student Prince.

Bob told lousy jokes, I remember vividly that during our time at Cerberus he would sit on the end of my bunk and tell jokes for ages keeping me awake. He did lots of good things for many people and was appreciated by many.

Bob's passion in life (other than Family) was his Central Coast Concert Band, which he started last Century, and he still played up to the end of last year. His other loves were his Lodge and making long phone calls, but the phone is silent now.
